BA MODERN LANGUAGES AND HISTORY (RV91)

BA MODERN LANGUAGES AND HISTORY (WITH YEAR ABROAD) (RV92) (for students entering the programme from October 2020)

- 1. This programme is available at Durham City, in a full-time mode of study. The lead department is the School of Modern Languages and Cultures.
- 2. Students may choose modules in one of the following Modern Languages: Arabic, French, German, Italian, Russian, or Spanish.
- 3. To study any of the language modules listed at Levels 2 or 3, candidates must have passed an advanced or beginners' language module with the same prefix at the previous level.
- 4. Students studying an advanced language module must take at least one twenty-credit optional module at the same level with the same prefix.

Level 1 (Certificate)

- 5. Candidates shall study and be assessed in modules to the value of 60 credits, as follows:
 - EITHER 20 credits of advanced language modules taken from List A
 - OR 40 credits of beginners' language modules taken from List B
 - The remainder of the 60 available credits, either 20 or 40, should be taken from List C.

YEAR 3 (Year abroad)

- 11. During their year abroad, full-time candidates are required to spend a period of residence of no less than 7 months in a country, or in several countries, where each of the languages which they intend to study at Level 3 are spoken.
- 12. Part-time candidates are required to spend at least 4 weeks in each country whose language they wish to study at Level 3. These 4 weeks may be spread over the duration of the programme.
- 13. During the course of their time abroad, students wishing to study Russian Language 4 will undertake a Year Abroad project. The project will be submitted before the start of the Michaelmas Term of the candidate's final year of study. Part-time candidates will be assessed at the start of the year in which the Level 3 compulsory language module is taken. Candidates who pass will be permitted to study Russian Language 4 at Level 3.
